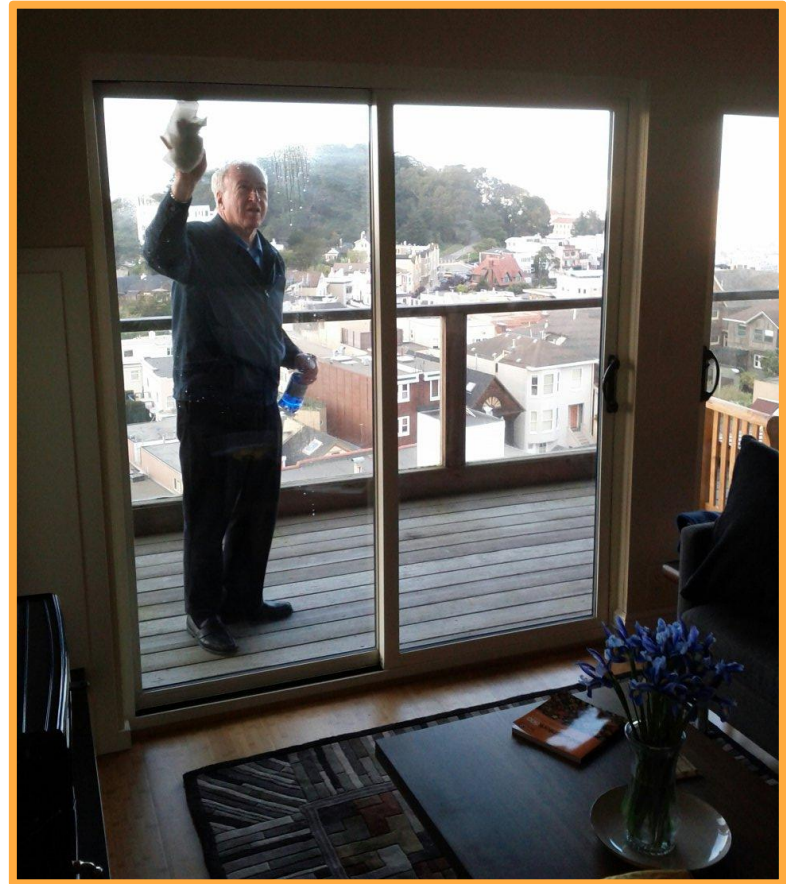


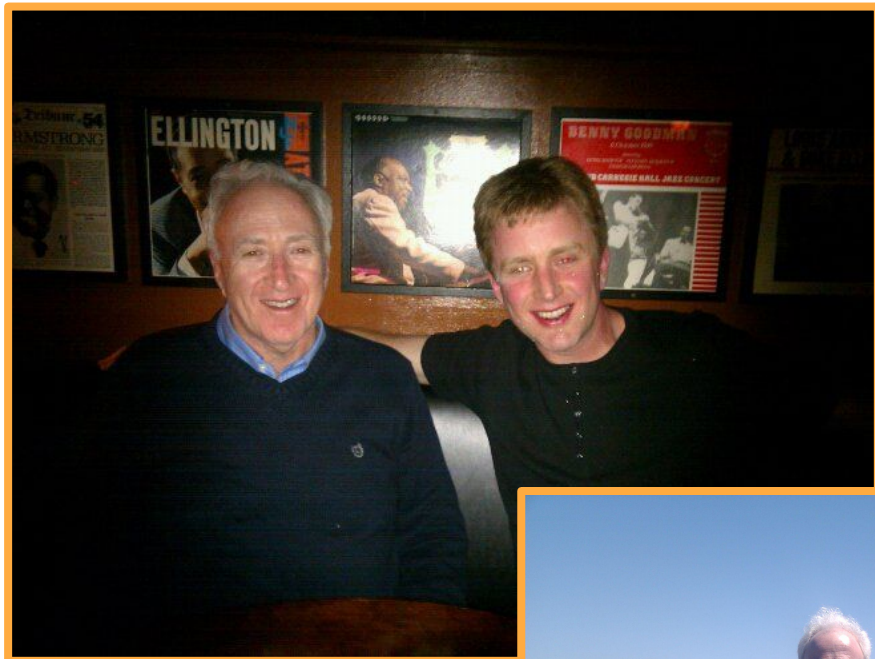






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## Palatine Executive Moves To Research

A company that manufactures paint and thermal insulative coatings that protect railroad cars carrying liquid propane, has moved to facilities on Rangeview Rd. in Mississauga.

DeSoto Coatings Limited's president and general manager, Harvey L. Beeferman, said the firm has experienced dramatic growth over the past five years and they saw the need for expanded production, administrative and research facilities.

The new Mississauga plant is a wholly-owned subsidiary of DeSoto Coatings Limited.

## Locals do pay school operations

ACT 388 is a godsend for Beaufort County full-time residents who own property. Many are retired and living on fixed incomes.

Passed in 2006, the act added another 1 percent to the state sales tax to fund school operations. Interesting how few stories in your newspaper include that detail. Full-time residents were then relieved of paying the school operations portion of their real estate taxes. Full-time residents are also subject to the 7 percent state income tax, the highest in the Southeast.

I'm going to reveal in this article the best-kept secret in Beaufort County, and along with it several good reasons why the referendum on the S.C. 170 tax should be defeated.

I don't oppose expansion of the road, and I don't need to see more pictures of people hurt in accidents to convince me. The issue is how the project will be financed.

The money for the expansion should come from user-related taxes, such as the 34-cent combined state and local oil tax per gallon we now pay on gasoline.

User-related taxes are the fairest way to tax. Sales taxes are regressive in nature and the least fair.

Until recently, the federal government has been returning only 50 to 60 percent of the gas tax money collected in our state. Politically powerful states such as West Virginia and Massachusetts have been getting far more than they put in, and southern states have been neglected.

In South Carolina, only about 11 of the 16 cents of state gas tax have been going to roads. Both the federal and state governments have been using gas tax money to balance their budgets. Both currently have a surplus. Why should we introduce a sales tax here to make up highway fund taxes that have been diverted?

Now, I want to reveal the best kept secret in Beaufort County. In June of this year, President Clinton signed into law the biggest transportation bill ever, called the Transportation Equity

Act for the 21st Century, nicknamed "TEA 21." It gives back to the states more than \$200 billion during the 1998-2003 period. TEA 21 was bipartisan legislation, and it assured that federal gas taxes would be used for transportation needs. It also provides for every state to receive at least 90.5 percent of the money collected within that state. Seems fair to me.

U.S. Sen. Fritz Hollings, take a bow for supporting this act for the benefit of South Carolinians, U.S. Reps. Bob Inglis and Floyd Spence, you get Bronx cheerers since you did not do so, for reasons of your own.

How big is TEA 21? South Carolina received a 79 percent increase for the next six years—more than any other state. TEA 21 allocations to South Carolina amount to \$2.5 billion, an \$1.1 billion increase. This "petty cash," as S.C. 170 tax proponents have called it, amounts to \$960 per person over the next six years.

TEA 21 was approved after the S.C. 170 referendum was put on the ballot. It totally undermines the need for the sales tax. Tax proponents have also said TEA

21 money can't be used for new construction or for S.C. 170 in particular. This is yet another misrepresentation. I have received written confirmation from the South Carolina Department of Transportation, via Sen. Hollings' office, that portions of TEA 21 could be used for S.C. 170. I'm sure many public supporters of the tax would reconsider now that these facts are evident.

If Beaufort County voters are foolish enough to vote for the S.C. 170 tax, we will be paying twice for our roads, once through a gas tax and then again through a sales tax. It's that simple.

We will also be opening the door for raising this tax permanent. Once initial resistance to this tax is overcome, it can be renewed again and again. Local option tax referendums are often one-sided battles. Who speaks for taxpayers? Special interests fund these things because they benefit. Our neighbors in Chatham County put in a "temporary" sales tax in 1985. It has been renewed four times and is now authorized until 2004. One renewal was for a Maritime Trade Center.

If the S.C. 170 tax is passed, I have no doubt that a new "need" will develop when it is about to expire. A sports complex, more roads—whatever. Trust me on that one.

So let's defeat the tax and then urge the state to get on with its job. The money is there. Use it.

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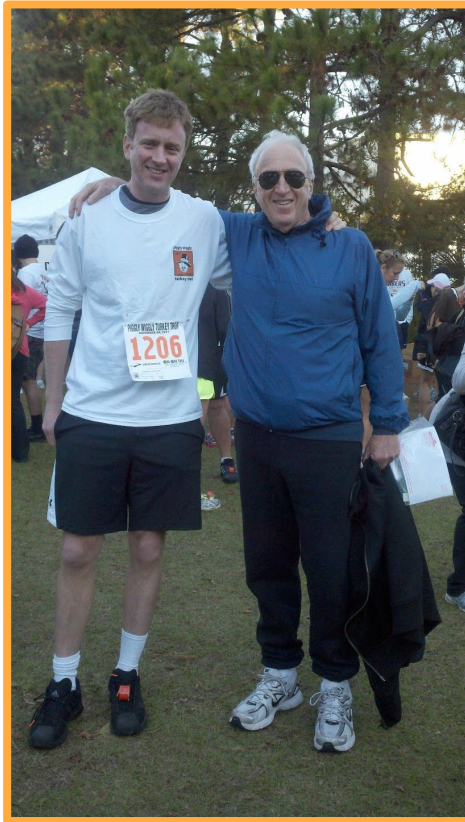

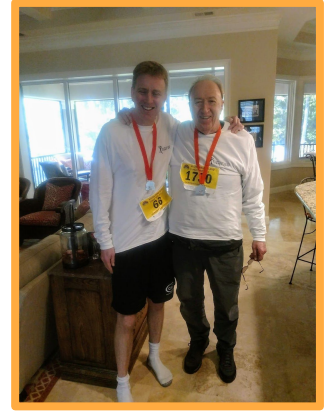
